Winstone Community Pop Up Saturday 14th November


We think that having something to look forward to in lockdown & winter is really important. That is why we have decided to open the Winstone Community pop up take away that will run every Saturday until further notice.

Update on The Auction of the Late Joyce Haslam's Paintings

As I'm sure you know, a sealed bid auction took place during the weekend of 24th & 25th October in the Village Hall which had been made "Covid secure" in line with Government legislation. More to the point some 15 paintings were purchased by local residents raising nearly £500 in total.

Earlier in the year Elkstone Good Neighbours Initiative had received a local authority grant of $\pounds 500$ for helping neighbours during the C-19 pandemic. Later they were disappointed to learn that LA rules prohibited any money going to the parish church. Therefore, the village hall committee have generously donated $\pounds 400$ from the auction to the parish church whilst retaining the residual to cover their costs on the website, heating & lighting during two days of the exhibition etc.

This means we still have 20 watercolour paintings available. These will soon be identified on the village website: https://www.elkstonevillage.com/?page_id=4764

In January we intend to re-auction the remaining pictures online with a reduced reserve price of $\mathcal{L}10$. Parish Link magazine & other means will be used to invite bids from residents of nearby villages such as Winstone & Syde. If any paintings are still left by the autumn these can be auctioned off at our Harvest Festival & the proceeds split equally between parish church & village hall.

News From The Trust, A Reflection On 2020

When the COVID pandemic broke in March 2020 the Trust was ready with supplies & it put in various changes to accommodate the huge increase patients being admitted, many of whom were critically ill. All the staff, including the board, nurses & doctors, & the allied health professionals responded magnificently as the pressure built up. Retired employees came back to work, the number of volunteers working in the hospitals increased & the public sector support was outstanding. The staff of our subsidiary company, Gloucester Managed Services, also worked constantly to ensure a clean & safe environment, provide porters & keep patients fed.

The personal toll on the staff however was enormous as they worked long shifts, moved across wards & departments & into new roles to fulfil need & all the time wearing full PPE. Tired, anxious, concerned about their own health & that of their families they still went above & beyond to put patient care first. Those working in critical care had the added emotional burden of looking after critically ill & dying patients whose families could not be with them. Some wonderful messages of appreciation were received which boosted morale but even so, as the second wave comes in, many are still struggling to recover from what they have already been through.

A comprehensive wellbeing support hub was established & about 8,000 staff approached it for advice & care. Freedom to Speak Up Guardians are always there, with the aim of helping all

staff to feel safe, to raise concerns in a confidential & supportive environment, & peer buddies also offer a support network. Staff were encouraged to rest whenever they could, & to break out for a while if they felt overwhelmed, sanctuary rooms for this were made available. The second wave of the pandemic has now hit & although the number of inpatients is rising rapidly, fortunately very few are in critical care. Changes made to various services because of the pandemic have proved to be beneficial to both staff & patients & will continue. The innovative digital progress made has had a huge impact, freeing up staff time allowing them to be more 'on the ward', allowing consultants to assess patients without having to travel far, & enabling virtual visiting for families. The virtual ward will allow for earlier discharge for patients safe in the knowledge that their progress at home will be continuously monitored. Partners in the Integrated Care Services are working more closely together. The Trust has also been selected as one of only 3 pilot sites in the South West to be able to introduce twice weekly tests for frontline staff.

Gloucestershire is currently the best performing system in the South West with respect to the national ask of restoring planned activity to pre-pandemic levels. Of note is our outpatient & inpatient activity levels which are currently exceeding activity done in the same period last year & our ability to still deliver CT & MRI imaging within the national 6-week standard. We have been rated once again with a 5* for food hygiene following a surprise visit from Environmental Health. Moving forward, after Public consultation, plans from the Trust on changes for Fit for The Future have now restarted. Finally, a governor's role includes not only holding the Non-Executive Directors to account, but also being an essential link between the communities that we represent & the board, ensuring that everyone's views are heard. I would therefore like to finish by saying a huge thank you to the editors of various local newsletters who not only publish my news & give me timely reminders, but who also feedback the comments they receive. I would also like to thank those of you who contact me personally.

I will continue to keep you informed so that together we can help ensure that the services the Trust provides reflect the need & priorities of those it serves.
