Nature Notes

December is a quiet month weather-wise often characterized by still, expansive skies and empty landscapes: the prelude to winter taking hold. Against this greyness the nation's favourite bird, the Robin, injects a welcome blast of colour and character and through this has developed a strong association with the coming of Christmas. Some might remember that postmen used to be called Robins because of the red tunics they use to wear, strengthening the Christmas connection through the delivery of Christmas cards. The Robin is a common visitor to gardens and once attracted to your bird table it will return all winter through. Perhaps the best way to see a Robin is to take some exercise and dig over a flower bed for winter; within minutes one is likely to perch on a fence or branch nearby waiting to inspect the newly-turned soil for earthworms.

Robins are fiercely territorial over food supply. Not more than one robin will occupy a small garden, unless it is his mate. When their food source becomes scarce in winter they will eat just about anything put out for them on a bird table, especially fatty foods such as bacon rind and cheese.

So have a great Christmas and look after your Robin.

Cotswold District Council is working with Severn Wye Energy Agency to help people improve the energy efficiency of their homes and reduce their fuel bills. Severn Wye manages Warm and Well, the Council's approved energy efficiency advice scheme. Warm and Well offers a free phone advice line, providing local energy efficiency advice and information on how householders can make their homes more energy efficient and save money on their fuel bills. Trained energy advisors can help residents in your area by informing them if there is funding available for any necessary works, referring them into the Warm and Well scheme if they are eligible for support, or directing them to local installers who can carry out the work.

Cotswold District Council is on the hunt for communities who can find innovative ways to Reuse, Recycle and Reduce waste.

The Council is joining forces with its environmental services provider Ubico Ltd and the Gloucestershire Joint Waste Partnership to launch the gRRReen awards competition. In line with the 'three R's' (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle), communities will be urged to find new ways to combat waste being sent to landfill. The three best performers will qualify for funding worth a total of £2,000 to finance further improvements.

The competition **begins on 24 November and runs until 20 February 2015**. It will be open to groups of people of all ages who want to pool ideas and develop initiatives to reduce waste - and also show how their improvements can be sustained.

Application details will be announced on 24 November. The entries will be judged at the end of February by a panel drawn from the Council, the Joint Waste Team and Ubico, and they will award £1,000 to the best entry, £700 to the runner-up and £300 to the third placed group on the understanding that that prize money would be used to continue progress with green initiatives.

Commenting on the gRRReen awards, Cllr Sue Coakley, CDC Cabinet Member for the Environment, said:

"Thanks to our residents, recycling levels in this District are the highest in Gloucestershire, but the tonnage figures have dipped over the last year, and we hope that this new competition will boost our totals again. This is a great opportunity for communities to join together and really make a difference – we can make this beautiful district an even better place for residents and visitors to enjoy."

"We are trying not to be too prescriptive about what comprises a 'community' for the purposes of this competition – the main objective is to encourage people to work together and take on the gRRReen challenge. We are looking forward to see what they can achieve and, hopefully, all the competitors will inspire others."

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor.

I am (again) mounting a campaign against the Loop Scheme.

The Loop will not help Elkstone: just ask Google maps for directions from Charlton Kings to Cirencester.

GCC is spending £500,000 on promoting this awful scheme: yet they plead poverty when it comes to making the Elkstone rat-run unattractive (wider verges, passing spaces etc.) Wearing my CampaignforBetterTransport hat, I have a petition running that has produced far more supporters than I would have hoped for (the epetition.gov.uk could only amass 127 before it closed.)

GCC has over 6,000 - which basically means that 29,000 AADT did not support them, despite their advertising.

What we need is a full study of the route within the AONB to go into the Autumn Statement. We do not want is the Loop to go into the Autumn Statement all by itself. I have influential allies that are pressing for this.

Yes - we do need to keep the traffic flowing on the A417, thus stopping congestion and rat-running through the other side (e.g. Caudle Green), but a simple underpass with a green bridge (and I don't mean paint!!!) between the cottages and the Air Balloon Pub would eliminate the cross-over of traffic caused by the re-routing of the A40.

Please have a look at the petition and its link to the CBT blog to see what we consider to be a workable option. It contains the traffic rather than increasing it, and keeps it moving - slowly! http://www.change.org/p/no-loop-scheme-in-the-cotswolds-aonb

This may have been too late for the November Newsletter, but I am hoping to stage a Protest Rally at the Air Balloon Inn on Churchill's birthday, 30th November; I am sure we don't want the Loop, so is there any way we can rouse people to stand up to Glos. CC? *Christine Shine*


